

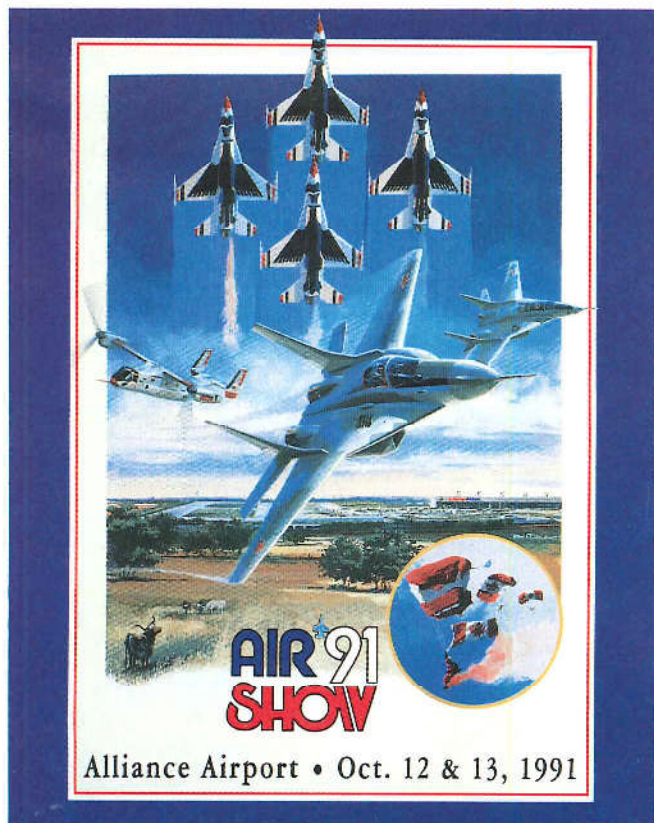

ALLIANCE TO HOST AIR SHOW

A spectacular aviation industry event, "Air Show '91", will take place this year at Alliance Airport.

Featuring some of the world's most famous aircraft and flying teams, the event Oct. 12-13 will be dedicated to those who served during Operation Desert Storm. There will be demonstrations by the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds in F-16 aircraft, and for the first time in the Southwest, appearances by the Soviet Union's MIG-29's and IL-76 Giant Mothership.



On the ground, displays include U.S. military aircraft used during Desert Storm, World War II planes, antique and classic aircraft, the B1 Bomber and the Shockwave Triple Engine Jet Truck.

Alliance was chosen as the site for this year's air show because it offers so much space, according to Mel Haas, chairman. "Alliance is an ideal spot for air shows, primarily because there's no congested area around the airport, as at other air fields."

In addition, Haas pointed out, Alliance provides easy access, ample parking, and plenty of space for ground displays.

"Both the Thunderbirds and Soviet MIGs perform two shows — a limited show when air space is limited and an expanded show if they have more room to operate, as they do at Alliance," Haas said.

"Some of the other aircraft participants fall into the same category. In addition, the Soviet group was impressed with the length and width of Alliance's runway. That also contributed to our decision."

Alliance has the capability to handle 100,000 persons and park 30,000 cars. There is easy access to the area via three interchanges along I-35.

Tom Harris is vice president of Pinnacle Air Services, the aviation and management company which operates Alliance Airport. Saying that Alliance is proud to be a part of Air Show '91, he added: "The intent of Alliance is to serve as a leader in the aviation industry, and Air Show '91 enables us to demonstrate the airport's superior characteristics and capabilities. We are pleased to be a part of this important event." ■

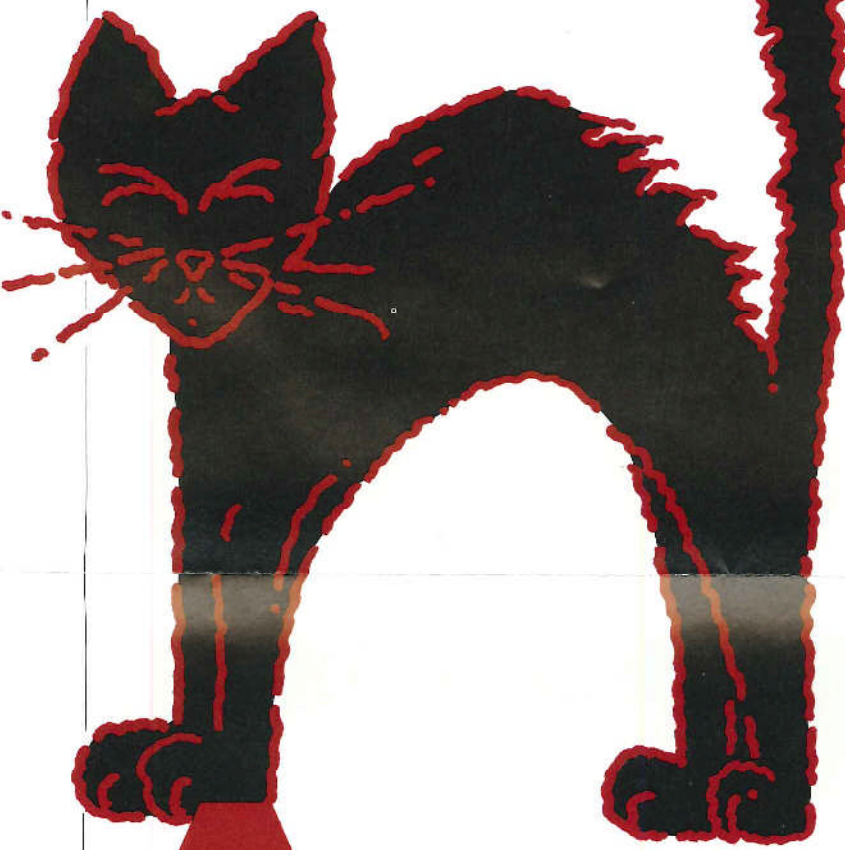
DON'T MISS SOVIET SPACE

A not-to-be-missed exhibit at the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History is Soviet Space, which features more than 80 tons of space equipment along with a variety of artifacts that have traveled into space.

The multimillion dollar exhibit, which lets visitors actually experience space exploration, will be on display through Jan. 1, 1992. It coincides with the museum's 50th anniversary, and along with it Omni Theater is showing "Blue Planet", film footage shot during American space missions.

Tickets may be purchased through Rainbow-Ticketmaster and at several other locations. Each ticket is for a specific day and hour. Each admission includes an audio cassette describing the special features of the exhibit. ■

HALLOWEEN BASH AGAIN THIS YEAR IN WATAUGA



All children in Northeast Tarrant County are invited to the annual Halloween Bash sponsored by the Watauga Parks and Recreation Department. A safe alternative to trick-or-treat on Halloween, the event will be from 6 to 9 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 31, at the Watauga City Hall, 7101 Whitley Road.

DEVELOPMENT RESTRICTIONS HELP YOU

Development restrictions such as those at The Villages of Park Glen are common in many new developments, and are put in force to assure a consistently high level of taste, design, quality and conformity in the community.

The major investment you have made in your home is also protected and all residents are legally bound to adhere to these restrictions. Some of the restrictions are as follows:

Residents may not allow trash to accumulate on their lots.

Residents are expected to keep grass, weeds and other vegetation mowed at regular intervals.

All boats, trailers and campers must be screened from public view; they cannot be parked in driveways or on streets.

No signs are permitted except those advertising your home for sale or rent.

Children's playhouses, dog houses, greenhouses, gazebos and storage buildings must be placed in areas not visible from the street. Approval for construction must be obtained from the Architectural Control Committee prior to construction.

Only one outside antenna is permitted, and it must not be visible from the street. Satellite dishes are prohibited in The Meadow and The Knoll, and must be concealed from view in all other areas.

You must obtain approval before undertaking any alterations or additions to your home. This includes construction and painting of fences, walls, and buildings of any type.

Please check your deed restrictions for full details. 📍

FALL CLASSES IN WATAUGA

A full schedule of fall classes for both children and adults is under way at Watauga Parks and Recreation Department.

Classes for children include pre-school, dance, karate, elementary Spanish and elementary French. For adults, there are classes in tennis, quilting, ceramics, cake decorating, country and western dance, photography, skin care, cooking, and Lotus 1*2*3* computer.

There are six pre-school programs scheduled, offered once per week year-round. Preschoolers get an introduction to colors, numbers, the alphabet and shapes. The children will do art projects, participate in show and tell, and have the opportunity to socialize with others their age.

Classes will be at Foster Village Recreation Center, 6600 Starnes. The schedule is: three-year-olds, Tuesday or Thursday 9 to 9:45 a.m., fee \$10 per month; four-to-five-year-olds, 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, 10 a.m. to noon Thursday, or 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. Friday, fee \$20 per month.

For more information, call 281-8047, or come by the office at Foster Village Park, 6600 Starnes, Tuesday through Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The recreation department also is seeking contract instructors for these classes: fabric painting, baking and cooking, arts, crafts, dance, drawing, painting, sign language, foreign languages, film developing, quilting, skin care, color analysis, car care, T-shirt art, knitting, crocheting, tap, ballet, jazz, clogging, tumbling, gymnastics, tennis and basketball.

Contract instructors are paid 50% of registrations, averaging about \$10 to \$20 per hour of class. It's a great way to earn extra money, and at the same time share your talents with others in the community. 📍

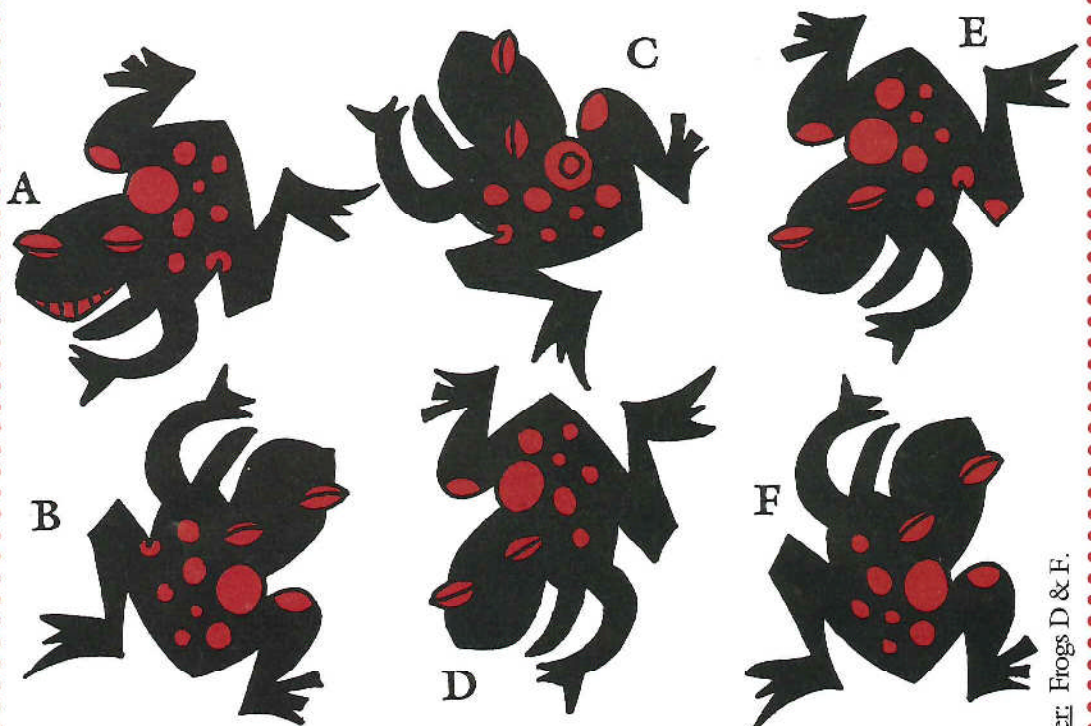
