Summer Swimming Pool Membership



At our request, The Longhorn Council (Boy Scouts of America) has provided a special deal to Park Glen homeowners. They have agreed to offer our residents access to their pool (at Basswood and Park Vista) for four

(4) days a week. The schedule will be based on pool availability, but at a minimum, it will be available starting at the end of May through August (and possibly into September at no additional charge). The arrangement covers Tuesday (4pm-9pm), Wednesday (4pm-9pm), Thursday (4pm-9pm) and Sunday (12pm-9pm). Times could be expanded depending on other activities that are scheduled.

Now, this agreement provides activities only in the pool area where there are changing areas and restrooms. In addition, the Longhorn Activity Center (LAC) will provide a certified lifeguard on duty for the duration of the hours in operation. This offer is extended only to Park Glen families (up to 5) for \$150.00 for the entire summer. Also, \$50.00 individual summer passes are available, as well as \$20.00 individual weekly passes. If you want to bring a friend, it's \$5.00 (limited to one per week, for now). You can pick up a membership form at the LAC or print one from our new web page at www. ParkGlenHOA.org. You can mail it in or drop it off at the LAC. Cash or checks will be accepted. Once payment is received and addresses verified your membership cards will be mailed to you mid May.



There are literally hundreds of projects in Park Glen that have been built without approval of the ACC. Some comply with the CC&Rs, but most do not. Also, knowing that we want Park Glen to stay looking like Park Glen but recognizing that our dedicatory documents were drafted many years ago, how do we ensure they remain relevant and enforceable?

Lastly, this board is dedicated to serving Park Glen in the very best way we know how. We hope you recognize that we are working hard on your behalf, but we cannot do it alone. I'd be remiss if I didn't say thank you to the number of volunteers who choose to spend part of their free time to make Park Glen as good as it can be. But now comes my challenge to you. As I will continue to say, Park Glen needs your help, ideas and time. Please find some time to join us at board meetings and lend a hand. Park Glen will be better that you do!

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

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Architectural Control Committee – What is the ACC, and why do I need it?

Park Glen is a wonderful place to live. Our neighborhood is the first in Fort Worth to be Master Planned by the Perot Group (now known as Hillwood) back in the late 1980's.

Many new and even longtime residents don't know or understand what the ACC does and why we need it. This article should help. There is much that could be written about the ACC but due to limitation constraints, here is a brief explanation.

When you purchased your home in Park Glen, part of the closing package you received is a set of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions (CCR's) that you agreed to abide by. The CCR's are in place to help create harmony and uniformity throughout the Park Glen community – which happens to be more than 3300 homes in 13 different neighborhoods wrapped up under the Park Glen umbrella. Without it, our area could look like any other neighborhood in Fort Worth. It is easy to say that the CCR's add value to your home, and that's not a bad thing!

In a nutshell, anytime you want to make an exterior improvement to your home, whether it be landscaping, fencing, paint, or home maintenance, you must first seek ACC approval. To begin the process, first find the ACC Request form. It is on our website www.ParkGlenHOA.org, and there is usually one in the newsletter.

Read the ACC Request form thoroughly – not many people do before they submit it. It it's incomplete, it will just be sent back for more details. Here is a sample of how an ACC request works – say Joe Public wants to add a patio cover to his home:

- 1. Joe Public obtains the ACC Request form, reads it, and reads through the CCR's for his part of Park Glen.
- 2. Joe Public passes this to his contractor who needs to be made aware of what is in the CCR's and must supply information to the ACC. In this case, we will need a plot plan showing the home location, the layout of the patio cover, and dimensions from property/fence lines. We will also need elevations of the patio cover to help determine roof pitch (a common denial for being too flat). This is something your contractor should have to be able to bid the job. Once all of the required information is obtained, Joe completes and submits the ACC request.
- The Association's property manager reviews the request for completeness. If the request is in order, it will be sent to the ACC Chair. If not, it will be sent back to the homeowner for clarification and resubmittal.
- 4. The ACC Chair reviews the request for completeness. If necessary, it will be sent back to the property management company for clarification, but if it's good to go, it will be sent to the ACC committee members.
- The committee reviews ACC requests in meetings held every other week. The request will be APPROVED, APPROVED with Conditions, DENIED needing Clarifications, or DENIED. Any denial will be accompanied by the reason for denial and if possible, how to correct the request so it can be approved.
- 6. All correspondence between Joe Public and the ACC will be handled by the property management company.

7. — Once your request is APPROVED or APPROVED with Conditions, you may begin work. You have 6 months from the approval date to complete the work. If your request is DENIED needing Clarifications or just DENIED, you will receive the reason why and hopefully a solution to get your request approved.

Some of the more common requests being denied involve the following:

- Front yard retaining walls are a huge No-No! (Tree wells are ok)
- Fence height lots of 8' tall fences are going up and most are not approved. Any 8' tall fence must get a building permit from the city.
- Storage shed size and locations. Part of Park Glen is restricted to 64 sf in storage shed size and some parts can have up to 100 sf. They must also be placed according to the city's "Accessory Building Guidelines".
- Landscaping some homeowners are wanting to turn their front yards into a low maintenance drought-tolerant yard, but there are restrictions that they should be aware of prior to filing a request. Read the CCR's!
- Solar Panels we're seeing more and more of these going up. Again, there are restrictions on how these are placed.

Some things to be aware of before filing an ACC Request -

- 1. Do not expect immediate approval we have a 2 week turn around to process the request. In cases of an emergency such as fire, hail, wind damage or any other act of nature, we will accommodate requests as fast as we get them. But to send the request this afternoon so you can start construction tomorrow, you can expect an immediate DENIAL.
- 2. READ the CCR's Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions for your village, which you can find on the Park Glen web site. Read these first and read them often!!

The ACC is here to protect your most valuable asset – your home! Our goal is not to tell you "no, you can't do that." We are here to help you to obtain the home you want in a neighborhood that is the most popular of all of Fort Worth.

The committee is made up of Park Glen homeowners. If you have some free time, please consider joining our group! We are always looking for people to be involved with the ACC process.



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Voting Information for Saturday, May 9th General Election

Did you know that in the last local General Election in May 2014, our neighborhood had approx. 222 people vote, out of a possible 6,657 registered voters? That is a 3.74% turnout. Some neighborhoods in our City Council District #4 area had a 10% turnout. If we could get more people to vote in this election (ideally 10%+, which is 665 people), we would have more votes than any other precinct that voted in the last May 2014 local election. If you vote in this election, it will help our neighborhood have a louder voice in working with local elected officials, because they will know that our neighborhood is interested in our community and that we have influence with our voting power.

An approved photo ID is required to vote: such as TX Driver's License, U.S. passport, see website cited at the bottom to get further options.

Early Voting is from April 27-May 5th. You can vote at any early voting location in Tarrant County. Hours are 8AM-5PM April 27-May 1st. And 7AM-7PM on Sat. May2nd, And 11AM-4PM on Sun. May3rd, And 7AM-7PM May 4&5th. Our closest locations are:

Summerglen Branch Library (4205 Basswood Blvd., Fort Worth, TX) Watauga City Hall (7105 Whitley Rd., Watauga, TX) Keller Town Hall (1100 Bear Creek Pkwy, Keller, TX)

On May 9th Election Day, Hours for voting are 7AM-7PM. Locations to vote are:

- If you live on the east side of Aracadia natural Park (includes all areas from north to south ends of neighborhood - you vote at Hillwood Middle School (8250 Parkwood Hill Blvd., Ft. Worth)
- If you live on the west side of Arcadia natural Park between N. Tarrant Parkway and Basswood Blvd – you vote at Summerglen Branch Library (4205 Basswood Blvd., Ft. Worth)
- If you live on the west wide of Arcadia natural Park and south of Basswood Blvd. – you vote at Parkview Elementary School (6900 Bayberry Dr., Ft. Worth)


