



You collect your steak expectantly from the grill chef. It looks great. You add some salad from the salad bowl and drizzle some dressing over the greens. A few onions complete the plate of food that you have been looking forward to all day. You slice into the meat, pick up some salad on the same fork and pop it into your mouth and bite. The beef is beautiful and tender but the main taste is the salad! What has your host done? The meat is bland flavorless and dry. He sidles over, looking for a compliment for his cooking ...

Ma always used to say that a 'workman is only as good as his tools'. To a degree she was right. If a workman (or woman) does not have the right tools for the job then the job will probably not get done properly. The same goes for grilling. So here are the seven essential tools that every backyard griller should have.

Thermometer - get yourself a reliable thermometer. This will enable you to check the internal temperature of the cooking food. This will help you to avoid overcooking and undercooking. If you buy a cheap thermometer, you could end up with one that gives the wrong reading so choose carefully and wisely.

Spatula - there are plenty of these around but as with the thermometer, it is worthwhile getting a good non-stick spatula. Make sure also that it is large enough to get under a big fillet of fish, which will avoid any disasters of the fillet falling apart as you flip it. Having one with a bent handle is also good as it makes it less awkward to use.

Wire brush - this is a case where the price doesn't really matter. The brush is just for cleaning off the grill afterwards. The important thing is that you have one as dried on foods that are re-heated again and again will impart off-flavors to anything you grill.

Brushes - You should get a couple of these at least, ordinary pastry brushes will be fine and can really save time. Keep one for oiling grilling surfaces and maybe 2 or 3 others for basting. Replace them when the flavors of the basting mixture do not wash out fully. You can use a spoon for basting but brushing gives a more even and thorough coverage.

Skewers - There are plenty of these to choose from. Skewers with handles are more convenient but whatever type you buy, get them

with a flat blade design. The simple sharpened wire design are a complete pain, when you try to turn the food, this type just rotate within the food, it then needs turning individually which is time consuming.

Mitts - heatproof mitts are a real boon, you can pick up hot stuff without worry. Getting a fireproof pair is always a good idea as there is always the possibility of the mitts coming into contact with a naked flame whilst grilling.

Tongs - if you buy only one specialist grilling tool, make it a pair of tongs. Many inexperienced grillers will just use a fork. So what is wrong with using a fork? Each time you flip your meat, a fork pokes holes in it and allows the juices to flow out. This makes the meat dry and reduces its flavor. You can use a spatula but that is more awkward and makes it a tad more difficult for a visual examination of the meat when checking if it is cooked. A good quality pair of tongs are best, cheap ones will distort, making food handling more difficult.

So get the right tools for the job and you will get better results from your backyard grill.

2015 BOARD ELECTION

The 2015 election for the Park Glen Board of Directors is coming up quickly. Here is the schedule that has been set:

- June 1 to July 15 Candidate Filing period.
- By July 20 Post candidates & candidate statements on website.
- Approximately July 25 Election America sends letter, candidate information sheet, and voting instructions to each homeowner, and sets up the website for voting.
- August 1 to August 31 Advance Voting period.
- September 1 Annual Meeting; in-person voting; results made known (assuming quorum has been met).

The Board has appointed Park Glen homeowner Justin Machacek to serve as the "Election Coordinator" for 2015.

With regard to candidate filing, Justin will:

- Collect candidate filings.
- Verify homeowner status with Tarrant Appraisal District at filing submission and again right after filing ends.
- Confirm receipt of filings to applicants.
- Compile all candidate information into one document for the Park Glen website and for the Election America mailing and website.
- Maintain secrecy until after the filing period has ended.

SUMMARY OF DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS APPROVED BY CITY OF FORT WORTH NEAR PARK GLEN

The following project have been approved by the City of Fort Worth. The City of Fort Worth's zoning code allows a project to get site plan approval from city staff if it meets the zoning code minimum standards. If you have any questions, please contact Arty.Wheaton-Rodriguez@fortworthtexas. gov, the Senior Planner with the city of Fort Worth (817-392-2561).

These projects may or may not eventually be built, but they could move forward if they choose. We have specified the buildings that we have been told are going to be built for sure or are currently under construction.

Intersection of Park Vista and North Tarrant Parkway

 At the northeast corner of the intersection (west of the new Sovereign Apartments), a Kroger Grocery Store will be built, with a gas station right near the corner of the intersection. The building will be set back far on the east side of the property near The Sovereign Apartments. They have gone out to bid for the construction of the site and will start in the near future.

- At the southeast corner of the intersection (south of 7-Eleven), two small 4800-squarefoot medical office buildings have been approved. The southern building is being constructed right now; it is anticipated that this is an orthodontist office.
- At the southwest corner of the intersection (east of Lee's Grilled Cheese Restaurant), there are several outparcels that are platted. One is west of the recently-built pediatric dentistry. There are 2 outparcels right at the corner; the property owner has indicated that a McDonald's is likely to be built close to Park Vista. There is also a site plan approval for a small 5,000-squarefoot retail building on the west side of the Tire Center (a little west of Lee's Grilled Cheese).

Intersection of Parkwood Hill Blvd. and North Tarrant Parkway


• At the southwest corner of the intersection,



a "Slim Chickens" fast food restaurant is under construction.

Intersection of Quail Valley and North Tarrant Parkway

- At the northwest corner of the intersection, a retail strip commercial building is under construction.
- At the northeast corner of the intersection (across from Academy, on the north side of North Tarrant Pkwy between Quail Valley and the Railroad tracks), a site plan has been approved for a retail center, including a car wash, a grocery store, and other retail buildings.



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
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Have YOU Attended a Board Meeting Lately? How A Board Meeting Is Run

- 1. Each Park Glen homeowner is a member of the Association. You have a vested interest in your community, and you elected the Board members to take care of those interests and oversee the operation of the Association.
- 2. The Board conducts open meetings (at least monthly), and you are welcome!
- 3. At each meeting, reports and announcements are shared with the Board and members (e.g. financial report, status updates, committee reports, property manager's report, event recaps,
- 4. Business matters come before the Board when motions are made and seconded. Each motion has a discussion period before Board members vote.
- 5. There is an opportunity at each meeting for members to speak to the Board and the members in attendance. If you have an idea, complaint, request, or concern, this is an effective way to communicate it.
- 6. If you would like an item to be considered by the Board, please submit your request or suggestion in writing at least two weeks before the next meeting. Please note that the Board may be unable to make decisions on items until they have done sufficient research and had time to consider their findings.

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
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Lawn Care: How to Grow Grass in the Shade

One of the most difficult situations homeowners face is growing grass in the shade. It's a battle you can win if you cover the right bases in your lawn care regimen. Learn how to succeed in growing grass in shady places.

Will grass grow in the shade?

Most lawn grasses need four to six hours of direct sun to survive. Some shade-tolerant grass types grow as long as light hits that four-hour quota – and that light doesn't have to be full sun. Four to six hours of dappled or filtered sunlight can fuel the growth of a healthy lawn.

What types of grass grow better in shade?

For cool-season grass, rye and fine and tall fescues offer the most shade tolerance. They require four hours of sun minimum to survive. Warm-season grasses that grow in some shade include zoysia and St. Augustine. When shopping for grass seed, choose shade-tolerant blends adapted to your region. Buy a blend or mix of seeds for shade because if one type fails to make it, another might. In this case, it's not budget-wise to skimp on seed quality in order to save money. Pay for a top-quality blend.

Could pruning my trees improve the light beneath them?

Removing lower limbs allows sunlight to reach soil beneath. Pruning interior branches to open the tree canopy permits more sunlight to pass through the tree's interior to the ground beneath. Removing interior branches also enhances air circulation to the center of the tree, which improves tree health. Hire a certified arborist to prune large trees. Learn the basics of pruning trees. Learn when to prune trees.

Do I need to mow grass differently in shady spots?

In shade, mow 1/2 to 1 inch higher than in sunny lawn areas. This gives individual grass plants more leaf area to capture the limited

sunlight that's available. Try to alternate mowing directions each time you mow.

Avoid scalping shade-grown grass. This happens most frequently in spring, when you haven't raised the mower since the final fall mowing. Shady lawns can't tolerate even one scalping; it thins them and they may not recover.

I've heard that trees create dry shade. Does that mean I have to water lawn under a tree more than lawn in the sun?

Under a tree, two things occur to create drier soil. First, rainfall doesn't always penetrate the tree canopy to reach soil beneath. Second, tree roots absorb available moisture. As a result, turf beneath a tree needs more frequent irrigation. Water these areas deeply to encourage deep grass roots for a healthy lawn around trees.

Should I water more in other shady areas?

If your shade is caused by a building, you don't need to water more frequently. Grass in shady areas doesn't use water as quickly as their sunny counterparts. Water only when necessary. Learn more about irrigating lawns.

I finally have lawn growing in shady spots, but it's always so thin. Can I do anything about that?

Growing conditions and lawn care for grass are tough in the shade. Aim to eliminate any stress the grass experiences, such as foot traffic. Insert stepping stones to protect grass from being trampled.

You can also overseed as often as once or twice a year, in mid-spring or early fall for cool-season grasses, late spring to early summer for warm-season turf. Don't forget to water after seeding.

Do I fertilize lawn in shady areas the same as the rest of the lawn?

Grasses in shady areas need one-half to two-

thirds as much nitrogen as sunny lawns. For lawns beneath trees, fertilize lightly in early spring before trees leaf out, then not again until early fall.

What about weed killers?

To grow grass successfully in shade, you want to minimize stress, which includes limiting herbicide use. If weeds are a problem, make one general broadleaf application in fall. Otherwise, spot-spray weeds with an herbicide as needed. Be sure to read the label to ensure it won't harm trees

What should I do if grass just won't grow?

If you want greenery, choose a shade-tolerant ground cover that's hardy in your zone. You can also cover bare soil with mulch. Natural materials such as bark, pine straw or wood chips look nice beneath trees. Light-colored mulches show up better in shady spots. Include stepping stones to add interest.

I'm trying to grow lawn beneath a tree. Does the type of tree affect my chances of success?

In general, it's easier to grow grass beneath deciduous trees than evergreens that branch to the ground. Beneath these trees, you're not just dealing with shade, you're also fighting acidic soil, which doesn't favor grass growth. You can grow grass beneath pines with a high canopy, which creates filtered light beneath.

The type of deciduous tree greatly influences grass-growing success. Hard maples have dense canopies and shallow roots that make growing anything beneath them a real chore. Grass won't make it. Dogwood and oak also offer tough growing conditions beneath their branches. Other trees – including locust, sycamore, ornamental crabapples and pears, elms and many more – happily host a carpet of lawn at their feet.

Swimming SafetyTips

Some things to remember to keep your kids safe when swimming. Whether it's a trip to the beach or a dip in the community or backyard pool, you can ensure that swimming is as safe as it is fun by following a few basic safety tips.

There Is No Substitute for Active Supervision

- Actively supervise children in and around open bodies of water, giving them your undivided attention.
- Whenever infants or toddlers are in or around water, an adult should be within arm's reach to provide active supervision. We know it's hard to get everything done without a little multitasking, but this is the time to avoid distractions of any kind. If children are near water, then they should be the only thing on your mind. Small children can drown in as little as one inch of water.
- When there are several adults present and children are swimming, use the "Water Watcher Card" strategy, which designates an adult as the Water Watcher for a certain amount of time (such as 15-minute periods) to prevent lapses in supervision.

Start Slow With Babies

• You can start introducing your babies to water when they are about 6 months old. Remember to always use waterproof diapers and change them frequently.

Educate Your Kids About Swimming Safely

- Every child is different, so enroll children in swimming lessons when you feel they are ready. Teach children how to tread water, float and stay by the shore.
- Make sure kids swim only in areas designated for swimming. Teach children that swimming in open water is not the same as swimming in a pool. They need to be aware of uneven surfaces, river currents, ocean undertow and changing weather.
- Whether you're swimming in a backyard



pool or in a lake, teach children to swim with a partner, every time. From the start, teach children to never go near or in water without an adult present.

Drowning is the leading cause of injury-related death among children ages 1-4.

Don't Rely on Swimming Aids

 Remember that swimming aids such as water wings or noodles are fun toys for kids, but they should never be used in place of a U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device (PFD).

Take the Time to Learn CPR

- We know you have a million things to do, but learning CPR should be on the top of the list. It will give you tremendous peace of mind and the more peace of mind you have as a parent, the better.
- Local hospitals, fire departments and recreation departments offer CPR training.
- Have your children learn CPR. It's a skill that will serve them for a lifetime.

Take Extra Steps Around Pools

- A swimming pool is a ton of fun for you and your kids. Make sure backyard pools have four-sided fencing that's at least 4 feet high and a self-closing, self-latching gate to prevent a child from wandering into the pool area unsupervised.
- When using inflatable or portable pools, remember to empty them immediately after use. Store them upside down and out of children's reach.
- Install a door alarm, a window alarm or both

to alert you if a child wanders into the pool area unsupervised.

Check the Drains in Your Pool and Spa

- Educate your children about the dangers of drain entanglement and entrapment and teach them to never play or swim near drains or suction outlets.
- Pools that pose the greatest risk of entrapment are children's public wading pools, in-ground hot tubs, or any other pools that have flat drain grates or a single main drain system.
- For new pools or hot tubs, install multiple drains in all pools, spas, whirlpools and hot tubs. This minimizes the suction of any one drain, reducing risk of death or injury. If you do have drains, protective measures include antientrapment drain covers and a safety vacuum release system to automatically release suction and shut down the pump should entrapment occur.
- Regularly check to make sure drain covers are secure and have no cracks, and replace flat drain covers with dome-shaped ones. If a pool or hot tub has a broken, loose or missing drain cover, don't use it.
- If you do have drains, protective measures include anti-entrapment drain covers and a safety vacuum release system to automatically release suction and shut down the pump should entrapment occur. Go to www.PoolSafety.gov for a list of manufacturers of certified covers.
- Check to make sure your pool or hot tub's drains are compliant with the Pool and Spa Safety Act.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Chicken Salad with Bacon, Lettuce, and Jomato

Ingredients:

- 5 slices bacon
- 3 cups diced cooked chicken
- 1 cup chopped fresh tomato
- 2 stalks celery, thinly sliced
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons minced green onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 dash Worcestershire sauce salt and ground black pepper to
- 12 leaves romaine lettuce
- 1 large avocado, sliced



Directions:

- 1. Place bacon in a large skillet and cook over medium-high heat, turning occasionally, until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain bacon slices on paper towels; crumble.
- 2. Stir chicken, bacon, tomato, and celery together in a bowl.
- 3. Whisk mayonnaise, parsley, green onions, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, salt, and black pepper together in a bowl until dressing is smooth. Pour dressing over chicken mixture; toss to coat. Refrigerate until chilled, at least 30 minutes.
- 4. Stir chicken mixture and serve over lettuce leaves and top with avocado.

How Many People Does it Take to Change a Light Bulb?

The answer is a lot! Companies here and in other countries around the world are on task to change the light bulb! New lighting standards are in place to positively affect the environment. Incandescent light bulbs are being phased out. Light bulbs are being designed to be much more efficient, save energy and ultimately save you money. Three types of light bulbs available are the compact fluorescent lamp (CFL), Halogen lamps, and light emitting diode (LED).

Here is what I learned in types of light bulbs. CFL is said to use one-fifth to one-third the electric power, and may last eight to fifteen times longer than the incandescent lamps but

contains mercury. The Halogen lamps are a type of incandescent light bulb but are said to be 40% more efficient. LEDs contain no mercury, and it is being determined that LEDs have a much smaller environmental impact than incandescent bulbs. LEDs turn on instantly at any temperature, their extremely long lifetime is unaffected by cycling on and off, they have no glass to break, and they don't emit UV rays that fade artwork, upholstery, and clothing. Another positive is LED lamps do not radiate heat onto the illuminated surface.

In an article from the Department of Energy, "In 2012, about 49 million LEDs were installed in the U.S. -- saving about \$675 million in annual energy costs. Switching entirely to LED lights over the next two decades could save the U.S. \$250 billion in energy costs, reduce electricity consumption for lighting by nearly 50 percent and avoid 1,800 million metric tons of carbon emissions."

WOW, right? Sounds impressive but where do you and I begin? And have you priced LEDs? While LEDs are more expensive now, they still may save money because they are said to last longer and have very low energy use. And similar to other electronics, the costs are expected to lower as more and more LED light

bulbs become available. Perhaps the way to manage and save energy, carbon emissions as well as reduce electricity consumption is bit by bit. As one incandescent bulb goes out, replace it with a LED light bulb.

So how many people does it take to change a light bulb? *Everyone!*

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TIPS FOR HOA MEMBERS

- 1. Pay your dues. Paying your dues (only \$66 per year!) provides the funds that the community uses to operate, enforce the neighborhood's policies and provide activities and programs. When you don't pay, it produces a burden and distraction on the Association and causes late fees, interest, and collection activity.

 2. Stay in the loop. Go to meetings (perhaps switch off with another neighbor to lessen the burden and keep each other informed).
- 3. Keep an ear out for neighborhood news. Talk to your neighbors and let the Board know your concerns and suggestions.
- 4. Read your Covenants and Deed Restrictions carefully. When you're not under pressure to make a home improvement or have spring fever over new landscaping, read through the rules for your HOA. Be familiar with the do's and don'ts of your association.
- 5. Keep up the appearance of your home. Our community managers conduct regular drive-throughs of the neighborhood and also respond to complaints from homeowners. Ensuring that your property is maintained (yard weed-free, mowed, and thriving; trees and shrubs trimmed; fences in good repair; house paint and structure in good shape) will prevent violation notices and fines. Every week or so, take a look at your yard from the street and ask, "what would a prospective buyer think of my home?" If the answer is not so good, take action to correct the problems. Your neighbors and community are counting on you!
- 6. If you get a violations notice, don't ignore it. Instead, contact the property manager to discuss the problem. Something can probably be worked out to give you time to resolve the violation. If you just make contact, you can probably avoid fines and further action while you act.
- 7. Plan ahead. If you know you're planning a change to the appearance of your home, read the CC&Rs, and make your ACC (Architectural Control Committee) request early (preferably months in advance). It can take a month to consider and decide on an application, and you want to have enough time to provide information, answer questions, and possibly appeal a decision.
- 8. Most of all, relax and enjoy the peace of mind of living in a community with an active HOA. Your HOA is dedicated to maintaining the value and beauty of the whole neighborhood, and that's part of what you love about your home.

Update On Sidewalk Repair / Tree Removal

On Thursday, April 30th the City of Fort Worth held a meeting at the Longhorn Activity Center to discuss the project of repairing the streets and sidewalks in Phase I & II of Park Glen. This meeting was a follow-up to the initial meeting held December 4, 2014. In that meeting, the City discussed plans to repair buckling sidewalks, curbs and street panels where there was damage or water pooling. In order to do these repairs, some trees located between the sidewalks and street may require removal.

During the initial meeting, many Park Glen homeowners expressed concerns over the removal of trees. Based on this meeting, the City of Fort Worth agreed to identify trees that they thought would need to be removed or potentially removed. The city stated their commitment to minimize the removal of trees where possible. In some cases, tree roots may be trimmed, allowing the tree to remain, providing there is no risk of injury or safety concerns due to the loss of stability of the tree.

Upon completion of the assessment, the City provided a list of potentially affected trees along with a map. Based upon this list, the Tree Committee began placing ribbons around the identified trees on Sunday, April 26th. Yellow ribbons were placed around trees that may need to be removed. Red ribbons were placed around trees identified as requiring removal.

During the April 30th meeting, the following questions and concerns were raised.

Can a homeowner opt out of the repair?

A homeowner may opt out from having the City repair their sidewalk. However, it is ultimately the homeowner's responsibility to maintain the sidewalk. If the homeowner opts out, they are required to repair the sidewalk at their own expense. Any repairs must meet City and State requirements. Also, any repairs done by a homeowner must be submitted to the PGNA Architectural Committee as well as being permitted by the City. If the owner opts

out and does not repair their sidewalk, they are liable for injuries resulting from improperly maintained sidewalks and can be cited by the City.

Can I request additional trees to be removed if not identified by the City?

No, due to the cost and time allowed for the project, the City will not be able to remove additional trees. If the City identifies additional trees are a risk during the course of the project, those trees will be removed at that time.

Who will determine if a tree needs to be removed?

As part of this project, a City Forester will be on site to review each tree before removal. No trees will be removed without the approval of the City Forester or member of her staff. At that time, the City will attempt to notify the homeowner. But the city will not delay construction if they are unable to make contact with the homeowner.

Will the City attempt to repair/modify the sidewalk in order to save a tree?

The City will determine if a slight curve or rise will allow for the tree to be saved. However, the City is limited by easement restrictions and ADA requirements. The City has pledged their commitment to save as many trees as possible in this project.

Will the City repair any water sprinklers or other personal property of the homeowner if damaged during the repairs?

Yes, the City will fix any damage to sprinkler systems and personal property caused directly by the project.

With removal of the trees, will the City remove the stumps as well?

Yes, the contractor will grind the stump approximately 3-4 inches below ground level

Will trees being removed be replaced by the City?

The City will not replace the removed trees. However, the homeowner has an option to receive a voucher for a free 5-gallon tree. It is the homeowner's responsibility and expense to plant the tree.

When is the project scheduled to be started? The project is tentatively scheduled to start January 2016. Homeowners will be notified 5 days in advance of work in their section. There will be no street closures for local traffic to allow homeowners to and from their property. Homeowners may need to park along the street as work is done along the front of their home. Additional information will be published as provided by the city.



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

Here are a few helpful suggestions and tips to keep your gardens at their peak performance during the summer months.

Weed once a week

Now is the time when tiny weed seedlings become huge monsters almost overnight. Pull them by hand or hoe them before they use the nutrients in the soil intended for your vegetables, annuals and perennials.

Feed the Roses

Any other heavy feeders should be fed now too. Continue to feed them once per month until frost. Most heavy feeders use a great quantity of soil nutrients to produce those big bold blooms we all love. Keep them producing regularly with regular applications of liquid fertilizer. Some compost isn't a bad idea either.

Dead head remaining spring bulbs that have faded

Clip off any seed pods that may have formed on your daffodils, tulips, grape hyacinths, etc. This will encourage growth underground for next year's blooms. Leave the foliage and let it die back naturally. This lets the plant feed itself and the parent bulb for next spring as well. Plant spreading annuals such as lively petunias next to it to camouflage it.

Remove spent blooms from annuals and perennials

Pinch or clip off any dead or faded blooms once a week. This encourages re-blooming and keeps the garden looking fresh and tidy.

Harvest fruits and vegetables regularly

Zucchini and summer squash may need to be harvested every day. Cucumbers and tomatoes need to be watched carefully and mature fruit removed promptly so the vines are not damaged by the weight. Corn should be harvested when the silk at the ends of the ears is just starting to brown. Blueberries and strawberries should be harvested as the fruits mature. Check them daily.

Don't forget hanging baskets!

Water them every day taking care to pinch off any spent blooms or dead foliage. Feed with liquid fertilizer once per week. Hanging baskets and container plantings need extra care in the heat. They can dry out very quickly, especially around the edges where evaporation occurs first due to the shallower soil.

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Refrigerator and Coffee
