When the lights are flashing and the stop sign is out.... Let's STOP! We can't be in such a hurry that it puts our kid's lives in danger. One accident is too many. Let's be safe out there!

As you know, the PGNA Annual meeting was held on September 1st at the Longhorn Council. I want to take the opportunity to formally recognize those homeowners that were members of the board last year. Scott Newell, Janet Jones and Teresa Biery were elected last September but due to other obligations chose to step down. They were an integral part of the Board and their service to our community is much appreciated. The remaining Board members were re-elected for another term. They are Jack Webb, Barry Bryan, Sterling Rice and Susan Kenney. Also, if you had a chance to join us at the Annual

meeting, then you got a chance to say hello to our newest Board member, Bonnie Hoke. I want to welcome Bonnie to the Board. Last but not least, Russell Zwerg was re-elected as Vice President and will act as our association treasurer again this year. On behalf of the Board, we are pleased and humbled to serve this great community. I want to personally thank you for entrusting us with the care of Park Glen for another year.

As sort of a recap of this year, I want to list a few of the things we did this past year and then some of the headwinds we have for the upcoming year.

If you recall, previously Board meetings were being held outside Park Glen. We immediately teamed up with the Boy Scouts and moved our meetings inside the neighborhood so they would be convenient and accessible to our homeowners. We scheduled two meetings a month through December because there was a lot to do.

Transparency was increased by finding ways to not use executive sessions. We encouraged meeting attendance and announced times and dates on social media and on the PGNA website. We improved how meetings were organized, announced, run and recorded by creating specific meeting agendas and minutes that were posted on ParkGlen.org. Now, if you want to know what's going on, you can find those minutes. We also added a standard agenda item for homeowner's comments with no limit on subject matter or time to voice their concerns.

In addition we conducted an audit of the Association's financial records and removed control of our accounts from the property manager to the Association. We also built in appropriate controls and accountability. We thought this was imperative to properly oversee and approve every penny that is spent. Another big change was

that we ended the relationship with our property manager and legal counsel and chose new ones. Both of these were a vigorous processes as we interviewed several candidates before one was ultimately selected. Which bring up another item, we ensure everything is competitively bid. From our storage unit to our event contractors to our legal counsel, we review proposals to ensure we are spending the Associations money wisely.

Now, for some challenges.... As homes in Park Glen get older, it takes effort to keep them looking good. With that, home maintenance and care gets more expensive. The traditional issues like lawn care, tree trimming and trash bins will still remain. However, unapproved property improvements and modifications is a challenge that this board will begin to address. In addition, mail boxes and sidewalks that are in need of repair are challenges that we need to tackle.

From a larger perspective, I believe that the business of your Association goes well beyond high grass and trash cans. Our neighborhood is, and continues to be desired for its tree-lines streets. This year the city acknowledged that most of our trees were planted around the same time. In the next few years we need to make our voices heard about a tree plan for Park Glen along with what they intend to do about sidewalk replacement, street repair.

Will you join with me? Park Glen must raise our hands and voices together. We must have a renewed interest in managing how Park Glen looks overall. In order to have the influence Park Glen needs, it will take a community, one collective voice. *Are you in?*

ANNUAL DUES

Bills for the \$66 annual dues for the fiscal year 10/1/15 through 9/30/16 (plus any unpaid previous amounts) were mailed to homeowners in September. Because the statements were late in getting out, the payment due date has been extended to November 1, with a late fee and interest applied if payment is not received by November 10.

The address and available methods for payment are different from last year because of the change in the neighborhood's property manager. Please do not use prior addresses or methods to send payment. The statement from RealManage outlined the new pay-to address and options for electronic payment. While you can make a payment by credit card, we strongly discourage this because of the fixed \$14.95 fee that would be charged to you by the credit card processing company.



HAVE A FRIGHTFUL NIGHT ON HALLOWEEN THIS YEAR - BUT KEEP SAFETY IN MIND!

According to statistics, children are likely to be injured from falling accidents on Halloween night four times more than any other night. Stands to reason, improperly fitted costumes, masks that block vision and hearing, and children crowded together, pushing, in a hurry to get to the next house. There are basic safety tips that can insure your family has a safe Halloween night. And since Halloween is up there in the top five most magical and exciting holidays, it's a good idea for parents to know what to say to their children about safety.

But don't wait until Halloween night to spring all these safety tips on them. Because of the excitement of the night, the sugar they may have consumed before going out, and the natural ability of children to tune adults out, you may want to begin addressing this issue long before then. It's easy to sneak in a safety tip here and there throughout the week before.

IT CAN BE SPOOKY OUT THERE!

With a few simple rules, your children can be safe. A large variety of costume can be found online from Indiana Jones to a scary pirate! Perhaps your trick-or-treater would like to be Tinkerbell or a Christmas Angel. Costumes are one leading cause of accidents during this holiday, which can be alleviated by making sure the costume doesn't drag the ground. By allowing the child to wear the costume before the big night, you can check to see if it needs hemming. And above all else, check the label and make sure it's either flame retardant, or flame resistant. Polyester is generally the best choice of material for the costume since cotton has a tendency to burn quickly.

Other safety measures include making sure your child's mask is easy to see out of and there are no sharp items being carried that can cause injury when falling. Have your child carry a flashlight, even if you're going out with them, or one of the

many glow sticks available. By going with children you are insuring their safety, but when you can't, always make sure children travel in a group and there is someone old enough to supervise.

It's a Ghoulish Thought, But Accidents Happen. Accidents can happen anytime, anywhere, but on Halloween night they are much more likely to happen for a variety of reasons. Shoes that match the costume are not always a good idea, especially if these shoes are hard to walk in, wobbly, or too elevated. A safe shoe to wear for tramping door to door on this dark and scary night would be tennis shoes. Explain to the little Princess that she can wear her shiny high heels during play time around the house, or paint her white tennis shoes with sparkly glitter and other decorations.

Halloween etiquette? It's always a good idea to teach children proper etiquette, but for Halloween it's a must, and it's a good idea to discuss this with your children before Halloween night. Remind them about sharing and making sure they don't crowd to the front of the line and push fellow trickor-treaters. Shoving causes accidents. Keep the excitement down by not allowing them sugar treats before they leave the house. And above all else: No candy consumed until they get home to have it inspected.

For older children who will be trick-or-treating without parents, make sure there is a curfew set, or better yet, make sure those older children check in with you periodically so you know their safe. Pumpkins Are Fun and have Smiling Faces.

What would Halloween be without carved pumpkins? It's fun to sit down with the children, dig the guts out of a hand-picked pumpkin and carve the face of your choice. But remember, a candle-lit pumpkin on the porch, or dangerously placed, can be hazardous. Avoid these injuries. Place the lit pumpkin away from where the child will stand waiting for candy. A child walking up to the porch with a frilly outfit on will unlikely pay



attention to a burning pumpkin and may get to near the fire. It's probably best to burning candles in the house or high enough where it would be impossible for a child to come in contact with it. Talk to your kids about the hazards of burning jack-o-lanterns and lit up decorations.

Halloween Isn't Just For Kids!

Adults and kids alike are drawn to the magic of "All Hallows Day" or "All Saints Day" as it was called in the past. There is much history on this day, October 31st, and plenty of celebrations for young and old, such as hay rides, horror movies, haunted houses, and costume parties. Make up your own traditions and pass them on to your children.

Originally, Halloween began as a Pagan festival among the Celts of Ireland and Great Britain. There are many versions of the traditions of Halloween. But no matter how you celebrate it, keep it safe for yourself and your children. Remember the safety tips, and avoid injuries this Halloween season. This is a magical night to remember, one that can be free of injuries, but full of haunting memories that will stay with you.

Have a safe and healthy Halloween. Enjoy the night!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Pumpkin Apple Streusel Muffins

Ingredients

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups white sugar
- 1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 cup canned pumpkin puree
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 cups peeled, cored and chopped apple
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 4 teaspoons butter



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease 18 muffin cups or use paper liners.
- 2. In a large bowl, sift together 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, 2 cups sugar, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda and salt. In a separate bowl, mix together eggs, pumpkin and oil. Add pumpkin mixture to flour mixture; stirring just to moisten. Fold in apples. Spoon batter into prepared muffin cups.
- 3. In a small bowl, mix together 2 tablespoons flour, 1/4 cup sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle topping evenly over muffin batter.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into a muffin comes out clean.


UPDATE TO CITY OF FORT WORTH'S MASTER THOROUGHFARE PLAN (FUTURE ROADWAY PLAN)



The City of Fort Worth is currently updating its Master Thoroughfare Plan (MTP), which is its future roadway plan. A public hearing was held on Sept. 2nd, and if you would like to see a video of the presentation given at that meeting and see additional information on the Draft Update, please go to FortWorthTexas.gov/MTP. The Update to the Master Thoroughfare Plan is intended to give more flexibility to street design based on surrounding land use, and to support multiple modes of transportation throughout Fort Worth, such as auto drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists, transit users. The Update is still in its preliminary stages, where the City is running transportation computer models to see if the proposed road types will function smoothly. The existing MTP provides for only three major road types: Principal, Major and Minor Arterial. The new MTP Update will provide for many more street types, so that hopefully the appropriate street type can be selected to match its neighborhood. Although it's subject to change because the proposals are still preliminary, the City is designating the main roads in and around our neighborhood to Neighborhood Commercial, which brings with it a maximum speed of 35 mph and a variety of choices of how to design the roadway. This is significant and an improvement for our neighborhood, because in the current MTP, Park Vista, Ray White, North Tarrant Parkway, Basswood, and Parkwood Hill Blvd are considered major or minor arterials which call for higher speeds and a design which has limited choices. We need to remain involved in the process to make sure that the roads within and around Park Glen are safe for our children walking to our elementary, intermediate, middle, and high school, bus stops, and that all residents are safe when driving or walking/biking throughout the community.

Currently the City has no policy to plant street trees or provide any other kind of ground cover other than grass seed for new or existing roads. An example of this can be seen on Ray White Road from North Tarrant Parkway to Shiver Blvd. The City is looking to possibly provide an additional document as part of the MTP Update that addresses landscaping and trees in the right-of-way. Our neighborhood can provide support for this additional document to call for street trees and appropriate ground cover for new and existing roadways, so that the roads keep up property values for the community, and make it pleasant to drive, walk, or bike in the community.



Development Committee - This committee monitors plans and projects and works with local government to exert influence over improvements, infrastructure, and development of our area.


Code Blue: Citizens on Patrol - Volunteers act as additional sets of ears and eyes for the police. Requires brief training at the police academy.

Crime Watch Block Captains - Coordinate and mobilize your neighbors to look out for crime and keep watch for each other. Requires training from the Fort Worth Police.

Architectural Control Committee - This committee will meet biweekly to review requests from homeowners for home improvements in accordance with the requirements of the deed restrictions. This group helps protect our investments in our property.

Village Advisors - These are folks who are willing to be a point of contact for homeowners in their particular neighborhood to help solve any issues or concerns that may come up. Park Glen has 13 different villages and our goal is to get a Village Advisor for each village.

Fort Worth provides weekly residential curbside recycling pickup, utilizing a blue cart available from the city. This is in addition to the weekly collection of garbage in the brown carts and yard waste in the green carts or on the curb. In Park Glen, all weekly collections take place on Monday, even on most holidays. Here is a list of items that can be placed in the blue carts

Paper

- Paper clips and staples are OK.
- Advertising circulars
- Cardboard corrugated cardboard. Large boxes must be broken down or cut to fit inside the cart.
- Cartons (including aseptic) milk, juice, soup, etc.
- Catalogs
- Envelopes with or without windows
- Junk mail
- Magazines
- Milk cartons
- Newspapers all sections

- Office and school paper file folders, letterhead, sticky notes, printer paper,
- Paperback books
- Paperboard cereal boxes (liners removed), soda and beer carry cartons, dry goods packaging, paper towel and toilet paper cores.
- Paper bags
- Phone books
- Pizza Boxes (yes, really)
- Shredded paper (place in paper grocery bag & roll shut to prevent litter)

Metal Containers

(Please rinse. Labels can be left on.)

- Aluminum drink cans do not flatten
- Aluminum baking tins durable type, not disposable
- Pots and pans
- Steel or tin food cans and lids
- Empty aerosol cans with spray nozzle; remove plastic lid unless part of the can
- Empty steel paint cans no liquids please. A thin skin of dry paint on bottom and sides is OK; remove and recycle the lid.

Glass Containers (Please rinse. Labels can be left on. All colors accepted.)

- Bottles and jars remove metal and plastic lids, which can also be recycled
- Ceramics
- China
- Dishes
- Mirrors must fit inside cart with lid closed
- Windowpanes (but no auto glass)

Plastic Containers (Please rinse. All colors accepted. Containers must be hard plastic.)

- Bottles, cups and jars rigid plastic containers with No. 1 through No. 7 recycling symbols on bottom of container.
- Food trays, tubs and bowls with no styrofoam
 with No. 1 through No. 7 recycling symbols on bottom of container
- Plastic eating utensils

Here is a list of items not to put into the blue carts (The following is not an exhaustive list of items that should not be recyclable. If still unsure, dispose of items in the garbage cart instead of attempting to recycle.)

- Aluminum foil
- Auto glass
- Clothing or bedding
- Compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs)*
- Drink boxes and straws
- · Food scraps or items that contain food
- Fluorescent light bulbs*
- Garden hoses
- Gift wrap and greeting cards
- Hangers (all types)
- Light bulbs
- Medical waste
- Plastic containers that held hazardous materials such as gasoline, motor oil, paint, pesticide or weed killer.
- Plastic bags including grocery sacks, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves
- Toys
- Styrofoam, foam cups, food containers, packing, "peanuts", etc.
- Waxed paper and waxed food containers
- Yard trimmings (set out as yard waste, separate from the recycling cart. Yard waste will go to a separate processing facility).





- Place items securely in boxes or bins (no trash bags) in the trunk of the car or bed of pickup.
- Remain in vehicle and allow staff to unload waste.

What is Accepted:

- Automotive fluids
- · Batteries
- Cleaners & chemicals
- Cooking oil
- Lawn/garden/pool chemicals

- Light bulbs
- Paint & painting supplies

What's Not Accepted:

- Commercial / Industrial Waste
- Ammunition & Explosives
- Appliances & Electronics
- Building materials
- Bulk trash & yard waste
- Butane/propane cylinders
- Medicines & Medical waste
- Tires
- Asbestos/PCBs/radioactive items



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
