President's Notes

Hi again and welcome to Spring! I'm always excited to get past the cold stuff (which is generally never really that cold), and on to better weather. In any case, I know a lot of us enjoy spending time outside and Spring is perfect for that. So whether it's just being out in the front or back yard, walking around the block or taking on a longer trek through Arcadia Park or somewhere else, the time is right to get out and about.

Each Spring I try to remind folks about some things the HOA can do and what it can't. As a reminder, the deed restrictions for all 13 villages are located at ParkGlen.org under the Documents tab. If you have problems knowing which ones apply to your address, our Vice President Russell made a handy dandy look up tool to help. You'll find it on the same page.

Everyone should be aware that the main focus of the HOA is to maintain property values. We do that, in large part, by enforcing deed restrictions. So the Board oversees the management company and make sure they are inspecting the neighborhood. Our inspector makes observations from what he can see from the street. No one should ever be walking into your property without your permission. If you believe that is happening, you should let us know so we can look into it. Sometimes there are city contractors and others working in the neighborhood.

We also have a volunteer group that manages the Architectural Control Committee or ACC. With a neighborhood the size of ours, some homeowners modify their property without approval, which is truly NOT recommended. Getting ACC approval for planned modifications benefits you by giving you the assurance that your project is in compliance and guaranteeing that the HOA cannot find fault with your modification in the future. If questions ever arise about your project, you need not worry about being pushed to remove or change the project.

Now, there are some things the deed restrictions simply don't cover, like barking dogs and partying neighbors. And the there are some things in the deed restrictions that the HOA cannot enforce. As you know our deed restrictions were crafted about 25 years ago with stipulations that make them very difficult, if not impossible to change. The result is that there is some language that we no longer have authority over.

In order to make an impact with items like these, the HOA periodically has reached out to homeowners individually to help them understand where there are issues. That type of effort generally comes with mixed reviews. But where activities like these impact safety or create extreme congestion with increased traffic, we tend to report them to the Police so they can cite anything that may be warranted from their perspective. The point here is, even though the HOA doesn't have direct authority, there are still things we do, albeit with mixed success.

I hope this clears up a couple of the common things we often hear about. If you have other questions about this type of stuff, my email and those of all board members are at ParkGlen.org.



Management Company Change

The Park Glen Neighborhood Association Board of Directors has decided not to our renew with management agreement RealManage when it expires on May 31, 2018. The Board is interviewing companies to take over our community management effective June 1.

If you have a balance due to the Association, please pay that as soon as possible (payment instructions are in the pink box on this page) or contact the Association Treasurer (PGNARussell@gmail.com) to make payment arrangements.

Starting May 25, homeowners should no longer send or initiate payments, property modification requests, or other communication to RealManage. Shortly before or after June 1, all Park Glen homeowners will receive a letter from the new management company with new contact information and payment addresses.

If you have PGNA set up as a payee in your bank's bill pay service, you may use that until May 25 to initiate payments. If you will not be making a payment to PGNA before then, we ask that you go ahead and delete that payee record on your bank's website to avoid the chance of using that payee in the future and having your payment go to the wrong management company.





Scholarship Program

Park Glen has a scholarship program paid for with the profits of the annual Turkey Trot 5K Race and 2K Fun Run. Park Glen homeowners and their dependents will be eligible to apply for scholarships for college and vocational/technical study if there are no open violations and no balances owed to the Association.

COVENANT CORNER



Park Glen residents are all required to follow our covenants, conditions, & restrictions. When our deed restrictions are followed, it helps keep our neighborhood looking nice.

For example, all lots in Park Glen are to be maintained in a sanitary and attractive manner. That means that curbs, sidewalks, and driveways are to be edged, yards shall have grass, and be regularly mowed to never be more than six inches in height.

While it is merely rude for you or your yard maintenance company to blow clippings and leaves into your neighbor's yard, it is illegal to blow clippings and leaves into the street. This can cause them to clog the city's storm water drains, which could be disastrous for homeowners and result in a fine from the city. The best way of removing yard waste is to place it in an appropriate brown bag (available Walmart, Sam's, Costco. from hardware stores) or a green yard waste bin (available from the city) and place on the street every Monday morning for the city to pick up.

If you have trouble getting grass to grow, remember that grass needs 4 to 8 hours of direct sunlight every day. If your trees are preventing that, consider thinning the branches or raising the canopy to let in more light. It is usually not necessary to remove a tree (which requires pre-approval of the community's Architectural Control Committee) to solve the shade problem.

Let's all do our part to keep Park Glen beautiful!

Banana Spring Rolls

Ingredients

2 large bananas

8 (7 inch square) spring roll wrappers

1 cup brown sugar, or to taste

1 quart oil for deep frying

Directions

Preheat the oil in a deep-fryer or large cast-iron skillet to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C). Peel bananas, and slice them in half lengthwise,

then crosswise into fourths. Place one piece of

Boundary across the corner of a spring roll wrapper, and sprinkle with brown sugar to taste. Roll from the corner to the center, then fold top and bottom corners in, and continue rolling. Dip your finger in water and brush the last edge to seal. Repeat with remaining banana pieces.

Ingredients


2 pounds fresh strawberries, hulled

1/4 cup lemon juice



Gardeners "To Do List" For April



Planting

- Plant ground covers and warm season annuals and perennials as soil temperatures warm and the danger of frost has passed, such as cannas and gladiola corms. It's best to wait until next month to plant hot weather annuals such as caladiums, elephant ears, periwinkles, and zinnias.
- Plant warm season turf grasses (Bermuda, St. Augustine and Zoysia) starting in mid April. Plant Bermuda grass seed only when nighttime temperatures average 65 degrees.

• Early April plant: tomatoes, snap beans, radishes, cucumbers, corn, lima beans, mustard, peppers and squash. Late April plant: watermelon, southern peas, okra,

cantaloupe, sweet potatoes, eggplant, and pumpkin.

Pruning

- Prune spring blooming shrubs and vines after they finish flowering.
- Allow foliage on spring bulbs to die back and dry before removing, so it can store food for next year
- Shade trees may be pruned. However, do not prune live oaks and red oaks between Feb. 15 and June 30.

Plant Care

- · Fertilize azaleas when finished blooming according to soil test recommendations.
- Check roses, ornamentals, and vegetables for powdery mildew, prevalent in mild, moist spring weather.
- Check new growth on ornamental plants weekly for aphids and scale insects and treat if necessary.
- Apply first fertilizer treatment to established warm season turf grasses (first to mid April). Use a fertilizer based on a soil test (which may cost as little as \$10) and follow recommendations. "Weed & Feed" products are not recommended.
- . Mow established warm season turf grasses weekly or as needed.
- · Use broad-leafed weed control products to eliminate spring weeds such as dan
 - delions, henbit, and chickweed. Some types can damage St. Augustine. Always read and follow label directions. ~Begin harvesting cool season vegetables.
- Water all your plants when they're dry, being particularly diligent with new plantings that quickly dry out in our persistent spring winds. Use 3-4 inches of mulch on all flower, shrub and vegetable beds.




