Wildlife in Arcadia Park and the Surrounding Area

The Opossum



Some scientists call them “living fossils” because they have survived relatively unchanged for at least 50 million years. Opossums are often thought of as dim-witted, dirty creatures whose most impressive trick is acting like roadkill. The truth is quite the opposite: opossums are smart, clean, and greatly beneficial to humans. For Americans, opossum and possum are the same animal, but in Australia the word possum refers to a cute cross between a squirrel and a chinchilla.

The average size of the opossum is 21-36 inches long (including tail) and they weigh 4-15 pounds. The average lifespan in the wild is 2-4 years. They have a cat-sized body, grey fur with a white face, long pointy snout, round dark eyes, and hairless ears, four legs, long and hairless tail spanning over 1/3 of its total body length.



“Playing Possum” is a defense mechanism and happens completely involuntarily and automatically when the animal experiences intense danger. The opossum can remain for hours staring blankly and sticking its tongue out, showing bared teeth with saliva foaming around the mouth, and a foul-smelling fluid is secreted from the anal glands. If you find such an animal, the best thing to do is to leave it in a quiet place with a clear exit path. It will regain consciousness and walk away on its own.

Their habitat is deciduous woodlands with nearby sources of water, but they are extremely adaptable and succeed in a variety of habitats and climates. Opossums do not build their own dens and often take shelter in abandoned animal burrows, hollow logs, brush piles, woodpiles, attics and other man-made structures.



Opossums are opportunistic omnivores that eat a wide variety of animal and plant matter. They are mainly scavengers, feeding on dead animals, but also love insects, eggs, fruits, berries, and occasionally hunt small animals like birds, frogs, and snakes. They are immune to the venom of most native snakes with the exception of the coral snake. Opossums should be a welcome addition to your backyard. They do not carry ticks, and therefore do not spread Lyme Disease. They gobble up 90% of the ticks that attach to them. According to the National

Wildlife Federation, a single opossum consumes 5,000 parasites per tick season.

Opossums almost never get rabies because of their low body temperature, which is not a suitable environment for the virus.

Between January and October, opossums breed and give birth to up to two litters of 4-8 young each time. The gestation period is about 13 days, after which time the joeys are born and must at once claim one of the 13 nipples inside the mother’s pouch. They stay there for about 50 days and then begin to exit the pouch and spend time on their mother’s back. After about 100 days they leave their mothers to find their own home ranges.

Opossums are skilled climbers thanks to their opposable rear thumbs and long tail which they can wrap around branches. They are also good swimmers.

Redistricting Map Update

City Council will be holding its last scheduled public hearing on the Redistricting Map for the City on Tuesday, March 22, 2022, at 6pm in the City Council Chambers. Residents can register to speak in person or online by 4pm on Tuesday, March 22, 2022. The link to register to speak in person or online or put in a comment card (written comment), is here:

If you could please read the email that Park Glen and the Multi-neighborhood working group sent to City Council on 3/20/22, and if you agree, please write a short email to the Mayor and City Council (email addresses are further below), it would be greatly appreciated. The email could say you support the analysis and conclusions of the Multi Neighborhood Working Group and the North Fort Worth Alliance in their March 20, 2022 email concerning Map X, Version 4. 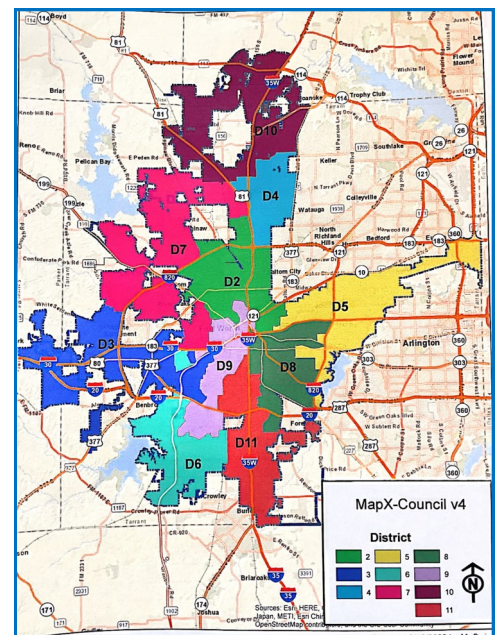

This Map X v4, keeps Park Glen in one City Council District, and keeps our surrounding neighborhoods in one City Council District with Park Glen. It also provides for some growth in the population for areas in far north, west, and south Fort Worth, and keeps the most Communities of Interest (neighborhoods) intact in one City Council District.)

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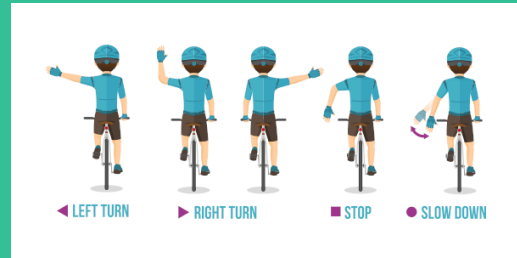

Bike Safety



Prepare for your ride

- Wear a properly fitted helmet.
- Check brakes and tires.
- Wear light colors to make it easier for drivers to see you.

Tips to stay safe while riding

- Stay alert.
- Put away electronic devices.
- Pay attention to lane markers.
- Don't ride between vehicles.
- Cross at intersections.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing.
- Never attempt to cross a multi-lane highway.

Follow traffic laws

- You have the same rights and responsibilities as drivers.
- Stop at red lights and stop signs.
- Ride in a bicycle lane if present, traveling in the same direction as traffic.

- If a bicycle lane is not present, ride as close to the right side of the road as possible.
 - Use a light on the front and a red reflector or light on the back of your bike at night.

Use proper hand signals

- For a left turn, stretch your left arm to the left.
- For a right turn, stretch your right arm to the right.
- For a stop, hold your left elbow out, arm downward, with palm facing behind you.

Tips for drivers

- Stay alert.
- Be on the lookout for cyclists on the highway, especially at intersections.
- If you're passing a cyclist, move to another lane if possible and give them plenty of room.
- Watch for cyclists who may need to maneuver around potholes and debris.

Easter Sugar Cookie House

Prep Time: 1 hour
Cook Time: 10 minutes
Total Time: 1 hour 10 minutes
Servings: 1 Large House or 2 Small Houses

Ingredients

Sugar Cookie Dough

1 cup shortening
 2 cups sugar
 2 eggs
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 cup milk
 2 teaspoons almond extract
 2 teaspoons vanilla
 6 cups flour – (may need another ½ cup)

Royal Icing (yields 3 cups of icing)

3 level tablespoons Meringue Powder
 4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar (approx. 1 lb.)
 6 tablespoons water

Instructions

For the Sugar Cookies

1. Cream shortening and sugar together.
2. Add the rest of the ingredients one at a time in order of appearance on the list, mixing each thoroughly.
3. Roll out to ¼ inch thickness on the back of a greased cookie sheet.
4. Cut into desired shapes. Refrigerate on the cookie sheets for at least 10 minutes.
5. Bake on a greased cookie sheet 10 to 12 minutes in a 350°F oven.

For the Royal Icing

1. Beat all ingredients at low speed for 7-10 minutes (10-12 minutes at high speed for portable mixer) until icing forms peaks.
2. Keep icing covered with a damp cloth when not in use.
3. Royal icing should have good body and be moderately stiff: It will not create a lasting bond if too runny and soft. For snow, I sometimes add a few drops of Karo Syrup to thin it just a little for a softer look.

Notes: This recipe was modified from this one to adapt to making a Sugar Cookie House This recipe makes enough dough to make a large sugar house or 2 the size of this one. Need only one house? Bake some cookies using the leftover dough. It might keep those little ones to keep from wanting to munch on the house especially if you let them use some of the extra candy. I would make a little frosting for them to use instead of the royal icing.

Stuffed Crescent Roll Carrots

Prep Time: 35 minutes
Cook Time: 7-9 minutes
Total Time: 40 minutes
Servings: 8 servings

Ingredients

8 sheets of foil (12" x 4")
 1 can (8 oz) refrigerated Pillsbury Original Crescent Rolls or
 1 can (8oz) refrigerated Pillsbury Original Dough Sheet
 1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, softened
 ¼ cup chopped fresh parsley
 ¼ cup chopped fresh chives
 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 16 small sprigs fresh parsley

Instructions

1. Heat oven to 400°F. Roll sheets of foil from shorter ends into cone-shaped molds. Unroll dough on work surface; if using crescent rolls, press seams to seal. Use pizza cutter or knife to cut dough lengthwise into 8 (1-inch) strips.
2. Wrap 1 strip around each foil mold to create carrot shape. Place 1 inch apart on ungreased cookie sheet.
3. Bake 7 to 9 minutes or until golden brown. Transfer to cooling rack; cool completely before removing foil molds.
4. In medium bowl, beat cream cheese, parsley, chives, lemon peel and salt with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth and combined. Pipe or spoon cream cheese mixture into cavity of each crescent. Top with 2 sprigs parsley for carrot top.



Notes: Gently twist foil molds for easier removal from crescents. Swap cream cheese mixture with your own favorite filling, such as egg salad or chicken salad.
