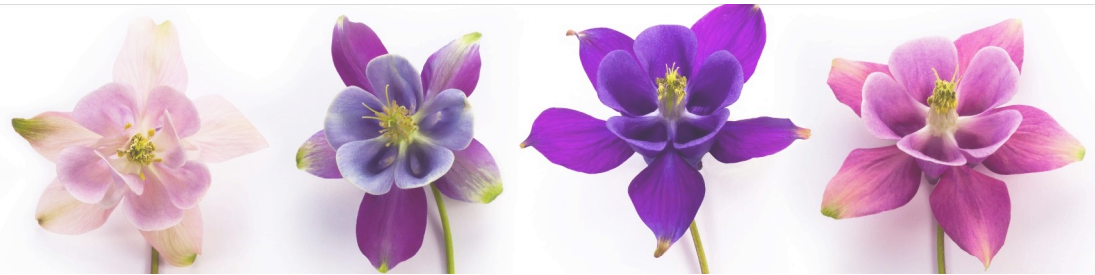

Wildlife in Arcadia Park and the Surrounding Area

The Squirrel



The squirrel family includes squirrels, chipmunks, and prairie dogs. Squirrels are rodents who have ever-growing front teeth that grow about 5 to 6 inches a year and must be worn down by gnawing. Texas is the home of eight species of squirrels, but in our park area, the fox squirrel (a tree squirrel) with a grayish-brown fur and orange hair on its belly is the one with the widest distribution. It weighs 1.5 to 2.5 pounds and averages about 18 to 27 inches from head to tail, with the tail accounting for almost half of its length. It has large eyes on the side of the head that allow it to see all around, above, and below. When it sees an intruder, it hides on the back of a tree rather than runs, peeping and moving around to keep the tree between itself and the intruder. It prefers open, parklike woods, but can adapt to a variety of habitats and seems to thrive around people. It ranges over an area of ten to forty acres, and they can leap up to fifteen feet horizontally. They are most active and awake during the day.

Food: The squirrels feed mostly in the early morning and late afternoon and are mainly plant eaters. During spring and summer, they eat buds, green shoots, fruits, seeds, bark, mushrooms, and occasionally insects. Acorns are the most important fall and winter food for the fox squirrel, but they also eat other nuts in their soft stage. Squirrels are well known for storing food for the winter and can smell and recover food from under one foot of snow! Sometimes they forget where they bury their nuts, which will grow into new trees.

Breeding: Young females breed only once a year, while older females breed in March/April and again in August/September. Their preferred nurseries are hollow trees, but if that's not available, they will build an outside nest, called drey, of twelve to twenty inches in diameter from twigs and leaves. Two to four helpless, blind, and nearly naked young squirrels are borne six or seven weeks after mating and develop slowly. Their eyes open at the age of five weeks and won't leave the nest until they are about ten weeks old. They can fend for themselves at the age of about three months and reach maturity at ten to eleven months. Life span: 4 to 7 years.



The benefits of squirrels: They are nature's gardeners and have an important ecological role as seed and spore dispersers. They are also an important food source for other mammals, snakes, and bird of prey.



Controlling Tree Squirrels in urban areas: Tree squirrels sometimes become pests in urban areas. Sounds of running or gnawing coming from the attic during the day often indicate the presence of squirrels. Running, squealing, and gnawing sounds at night generally indicate the presence of rats. Squirrels can cause extensive damage to the insulation in the attic or walls, and also may gnaw and damage electrical wiring. Redistricting Map Update

Background Info. on Redistricting Boundaries for City of Fort Worth

On March 29, 2022, The City of Fort Worth adopted a new Redistricting Map, titled "Anna as amended on 3/23/22" which creates ten (10) City Council Districts, currently there are eight (8) City Council Districts. Details are below:

Update 3/29/22

The City Council, on March 29, 2022, adopted a Redistricting Map, which will take effect for the general election to be held in May 2023. The map is the same that the City Council agreed to at their March 23, 2022 Special Work Session. The adopted Map, titled "Anna as amended on 3/23/22", keeps the Park Glen Neighborhood in one City Council District and keeps our surrounding neighborhoods in our same City Council District.

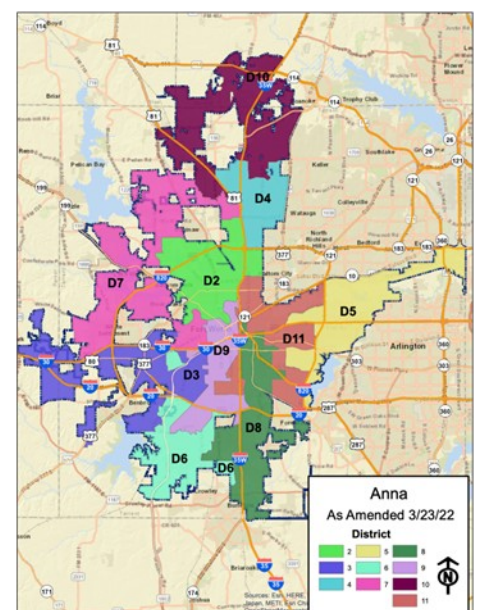
This map, brought forward by our District 4 Councilmember Moon and District 8 Councilmember Nettles, splits Heritage into two City Council Districts, a portion north of Heritage Trace Parkway was put in the District (District 10) to the north. The southern boundary for our District 4 is 820.

Thank you to all who wrote emails to/or contacted our Mayor and City Council asking to keep our Park Glen Neighborhood in one City Council District and in a District with our surrounding neighborhoods with whom we share similar interests and concerns.

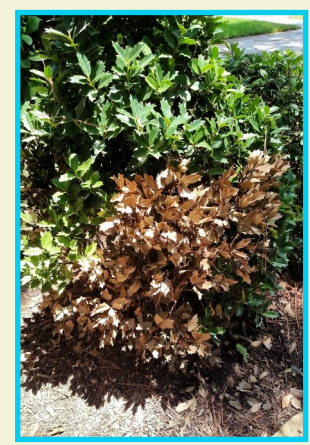


PGNA Landscape Corner

Late Spring (or Early Summer) 2022

The weather is getting warmer and although May is technically a spring month, here in Texas it is more like a summer month. Now is the time to nourish your soil with its first application of fertilizer and time to pull out the lawnmower, quite possibly your number one defense against weeds. Your first, and possibly second, mowing can be done at the lowest setting (Bermuda, Zoysia, Bent grass and Centipede) or next to the lowest setting (for St. Augustine, and all other varieties). This will accomplish three important functions: pick up most of the leaves, discourage weed growth, and warm your soil. Be sure to reset your mower to the appropriate height for your type of grass after your first mowing since cutting it too short will create health problems for your lawn as the summer heats up. Using the groupings above as a guide, set the mower to 1.5 to 2 inches for the first group and 2.5-3.5 inches for the second group. I have St. Augustine and allow mine to grow to 4 inches since I have fairly heavy shade, this allows me to go up to three weeks between mowing's. If you don't have grass, now is the time to seed and or sod before it gets too hot.



I noticed some of you are still holding out for a miracle that your plants that suffered in last winter's cold snap will return. If they haven't shown promise by now, they never will. When replacing your "brown" plants, be sure to take into consideration the light and size of your space and buy plants that will fit and tolerate the level of light you have. Don't purchase a plant that naturally will grow to 10+ feet and place it in front of your window unless you really like having to prune regularly. Also remember to look at the zoning label on each plant, we live in a Zone 7b or 8a, depending on which gardening reference you look at. Anything zoned 8 and above will require TLC the next time we get a cold snap to survive, and anything that is zone 7 and below will need lots of water and placed where it does not get the hot Texas sun in the afternoon and evening.

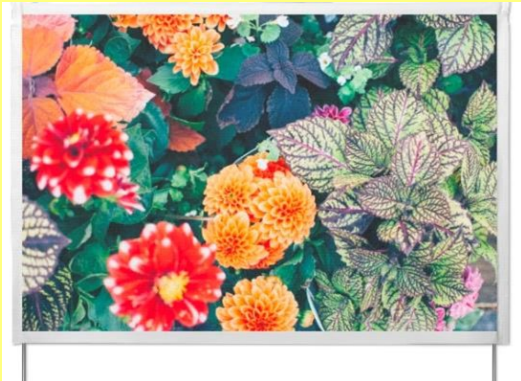
Now is also a good time to be thinking of getting your trees trimmed. Being a pet owner, I am consequently also a street walker (pun intended). On my walks I see many trees that encroach on houses, especially the roofs and eaves. This will cause serious damage to your roof and could eventually create a way for water to get into your home. Too much shade can also have a negative impact on the health of your lawn, shrubs, and flowers. You might want to consider having a professional come trim a few branches back. Talk to your neighbors, they might have a similar desire to also have a few branches removed and if you go in together to contract a tree trimming service, they usually will cut you a deal.



Which brings me to the last point I'd like to make this month... neighbors. Did you know that Park Glenn has a Gardening Club? Check them out on Facebook. There are thousands of books out there about landscaping, but many are not written for our particular environment. People who live here and grow here know what works and does not work, often through trial and error. The Fort Worth Botanical Garden or Dallas Arboretum are also great places to learn about what works best in our small corner of the world. The best way to get a vibrant and healthy yard is to use these readily available resources to help you get started on creating the yard you have always wanted. Who knows, maybe someone in the PG Gardening club may even provide you with a plant or two to help you get started. I can't think of a better way to get to know your neighbors!

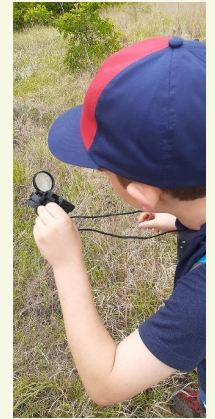

Strawberry Lemon Blondies



Prep Time: 15 minutes
Cook Time: 30 minutes
Total Time: 45 minutes
Servings: 12 pieces

Ingredients

Blondies

1 cup (2 sticks or 228 grams) unsalted butter, at room temperature
 3/4 cup (164 grams) granulated sugar
 1 large egg
 1/4 cup (55 grams) fresh squeezed lemon juice
 2 1/4 cups (306 grams) all-purpose flour (use the fluff/scoop/level method for measuring)
 1/2 tsp baking powder
 1/2 tsp salt
 1 cup (127 grams) diced fresh strawberries

Glaze

1 cup (112 grams) unsifted weight powdered sugar, sifted
 1 Tbsp strawberry puree
 (you'll need about 2 large strawberries, instructions below)
 1 Tbsp lemon juice, or just enough to thin the glaze to a spreadable consistency

Instructions

1. Preheat the oven to 350F
2. Line a 9-inch square baking pan with parchment paper with long edges. This will help you lift out the blondies for easy glazing and slicing later.
3. Cream the butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in the egg.
4. When the egg is fully incorporated, beat in the lemon juice. The lemon juice will probably not completely incorporate at this point, that's ok.
5. Whisk together the flour, baking powder, and salt, and add to the wet ingredients, mixing until no more dry flour is present.
6. Gently fold in the diced strawberries. Spread the mixture into your pan and spread out as evenly as possible. The dough is thick, so take your time.
7. Bake for 30-35 minutes, just until starting to turn golden around the edges and the center is set. A toothpick inserted in the center will be moist but not wet. Don't over-bake these, or they will dry out. Let cool on a rack.
8. Trim the strawberries for the glaze and puree in a small food processor. Strain the puree through a small strainer to get 1 Tbsp of puree. Whisk together the sugar, puree, and lemon juice until no lumps remain. If your glaze is too thin, add a touch more sugar. If it's too thick, add more lemon juice.
9. Spread the glaze over the cooled blondies. Let the glaze set before slicing.



Notes: Do a little test before glazing your blondies. Spoon a little on and see how it does...if it's too thin you can add more sugar, and if it's too thick you can thin it down with more puree or lemon juice.

If you don't want to bother with the strawberry puree for the icing, just use lemon juice.

For a variation, try this with diced rhubarb, or a combination of strawberries and rhubarb. Or how about blueberries or raspberries.

Caprese Salad with Avocado

Prep Time: 15 minutes

Cook Time: 0 minutes

Total Time: 15 minutes

Servings: 6 servings

Ingredients

- 16 oz grape tomatoes or cherry tomatoes
- 6-8 oz fresh mozzarella
- 1 avocado
- 2 tbsp fresh basil chopped, more if needed
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- A pinch of salt and pepper
- 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar, more if needed

Instructions

1. Slice grape tomatoes into halves and cut avocados into small pieces. Slice fresh basil into thin strips.
2. Drain liquid from fresh mozzarella and pat dry. Cut fresh mozzarella into halves (optional).
3. Bring grape tomatoes, avocados, fresh mozzarella and fresh basil into large bowl. Add olive oil, salt, and pepper. Toss to combine.
4. Bring everything into a serving plate or bowl. Drizzle with balsamic vinegar.
